This past spring, Mayor Volz recruited a citizen committee to create opportunities for the Jamestown community to collaborate with the Wyndham Golf Tournament to promote the golf event and The Town of Jamestown, which is closely connected with the Sedgefield tournament location. An ambitious committee created three different initiatives to promote the Jamestown Golf Course and Community, and to raise funds for the *We Build People* campaign at our local Ragsdale YMCA.



Will Ragsdale, Kerry Miller, Casey Mott, and Ogi Overman are taking the lead in the festival endeavor. They have established a non-profit agency that is quickly planning a “downtown” festival for Saturday evening, August 15. *Jamestown Swing into Wyndham* promises to be a fun event for everyone! Our Jamestown staff is working with the committee to assist with law enforcement, sanitation and recycling, closing Gannaway Street, banner and sign promotions, preparation of maps, and crafting the new “Special Events” Ordinance, which allows the gathering, street closing, and service of alcohol in an enclosed public area. We are also requesting the Post Office to re-route their traffic for a portion of that day.



Our local Civic clubs are recruiting volunteers to “man” hole number 12 for the week of the tournament in the name of “Jamestown”. Volunteers are needed for these spots, and Kerry Miller is coordinating this activity. Volunteers must pay \$40 to participate and they receive tickets, a shirt, hat, and poncho for this contribution. 

Smoke Detectors Recalled:

This recall involves Kidde dual sensor smoke alarms model PI2000. The alarms can be identified by two buttons, "HUSH" and "PUSH AND HOLD TO TEST WEEKLY," which are located on the front/center of the alarm. The model number and date code are on the back of the smoke alarm. Only date codes 2008 Aug.01 through 2009 May 04 are included in this recall.

Station 46 Run Report:

Pinecroft Sedgefield Fire Department just finished the 2008-2009 Fiscal Year. The department (all five stations) ran a total of 2579 calls. 390 of those calls were in Station 46's (Jamestown) district. Below is a breakdown of the type of calls:


Please do not include these items in your garbage as the Town cannot legally dispose of them.

As a resident or business owner I am sure that you are aware of the need for an aesthetically pleasing town that attracts visitors. Town staff makes every effort to maintain the beauty afforded us by our history, architecture and landscaping. With that understanding, I am requesting you to help us maintain an attractive town by trimming grass along sidewalks and curbs in front of your home or business.



This may seem like such a small consideration, but we've learned that it is the little things that make a big difference.

Town staff needs you to help maintain trees and shrubs along sidewalks. Overhanging branches obstruct pedestrian access and cause roadway sight distance issues.



Please plan to trim trees and shrubs to a height of approximately seven feet and one foot back behind the sidewalk. Any branches you remove may be placed behind the curb for pick-up on regularly scheduled brush collection days (Wednesdays).

However, if you will be considering an addition, doing construction, or other types of land development in the near future it might be a good idea to review the Ordinance. EMPLOYEE HIGHLIGHT— DAVE HORNER GIBSON PARK



Gibson Park, just off West Wendover Avenue, was formerly managed by the City of High Point. When Jamestown assumed management, the Town "absorbed" Gibson's employees, including Dave Horner, Park Supervisor. Dave has worked at Gibson Park since 1992. Since he and his wife, Judy, live in the ranger house at the Park, he is a true "full time" employee. Some of his duties include keeping the greenways cleared, maintaining

two softball and two soccer fields, planning and scheduling use of the fields and the shelters, and opening and closing the Park on Sundays. He also oversees the park budget.

Dave loves meeting people as part of his job. There are several regular visitors to the park he knows very well. As always, when you deal with people you accumulate lots of funny stories.

Once a group of 12 military men came to the park for exercises. Dave said 8 came back and 4 got lost! He had to go in and find them.

Dave is proud of his family. He has two sons and one daughter. One son was just promoted to chief in the Coast Guard in Williamsburg. He also has a granddaughter at Duke on an academic scholarship.



During the month of July, Duke Energy engineers and Jamestown's electrical contractor worked together fast and furiously to provide a new electrical system to our park facilities. Although staff plans to incorporate electrical system replacement in the proposed Golf Course Renovation project were suddenly derailed, it has been a relief to take care of this looming replacement project this summer. Staff identified the aged lines (35 years) and Town owned antiquated wiring system as a necessity for inclusion in renovation plans, but the replacement became urgent once one area suffered a fault.

Our Duke Energy Region Director Ronnie Taylor and our Senior Engineer, Edwin King responded immediately to our concerns and request for assistance. Mr. King and his associates quickly designed an installation plan and directed crews to assist our electrical contractor to remedy the power outage at Jamestown Park. Our staff is extremely appreciative of their professional direction and swift response to our emergency.

Working closely with the engineers, our Park Superintendent **Jay Gardner** has been an incredible manager in a difficult situation! Mr. Gardner managed to keep generators running, maintain the golf course and recreation grounds, as well as assist in the planning and installation

of the new wiring system during the past six weeks. Although noticing Mr. Gardner on the golf course day and night during the month of July may not seem unusual, I can assure you that Jay has crisis management experience now!

Our Golf Professional, Michael Hutcherson reports that our rounds of play in July (as of the 20th) exceeded the last two Julys. This is a testament to our Pro Shop and Maintenance staffs' ability to keep golfers playing and enjoying our course through a challenging experience. Thanks to our staff and Duke Energy officials for their hard work and diligence, and thanks to our loyal players for their continued support of our beautiful facility.

TOUR OF THE RANDLEMAN RESERVOIR

The Town of Jamestown, along with 5 other governments, has entered into a joint governmental agreement with the Piedmont Triad Regional Water Authority. The Authority was created to construct a dam, water treatment plant and distribution lines, so that the participating governments may purchase water from the Randleman Reservoir. The dam has been constructed, and the water treatment plant and distribution lines are under construction. It is anticipated that, sometime in 2010, the participating governments will start receiving water from the lake.

Some of the finance officers from the participating governments wanted to see the status of the lake as it stands now, so we were given a tour of the entire lake. The lake warden, an employee of the Authority, took us out in a boat, from what will be a public marina once the lake officially opens in March of 2010. We saw the dam, the water intake building,



where water from the lake will be taken in and sent on to the treatment plant, and much of the shoreline. It is a beautiful lake, and we saw an abundance of wildlife during our tour, including a bald eagle. We ventured as far as the new Southwest Park, where canoes and kayaks can be launched, once the lake is open.

It appeared to me that Randleman Reservoir is right on track to begin providing water for the surrounding areas soon. This project has been a long time coming, but now is about to come to fruition.
